In April the Parish Council together with the local police and two representatives from Trading Standards hosted an afternoon meeting about Door Step Crime. It was very disappointing that nobody attended the meeting.

In May the Parish Council hosted the Parish Open Meeting. In attendance were all the Parish Councillors, 15 members of the public, retired District Councillor Euan Robertson and the new District Councillor Susan Waring and Vivienne Chambers from the Lincs and Notts Air Ambulance Service. Her talk was very interesting and informative. The Parish Council plans to make a suitable donation to the charity. They receive no government funding for the invaluable service they provide. Euan Robertson has retired after 47 years of public service.

David Glendinning has retired from Rauceby Parish Council after 20 years voluntary service. This leaves a vacancy on the Parish Council. Highways Reports After many years of discussion the highways department have finally agreed to put in kerbs along Thorpe Drove, South Rauceby in the hope that this will help to maintain the verges. Work will begin sometime between 2nd July and 24th September 2007 depending on current work issues and the weather.

The repairs to the edge of Rauceby Drove are very pleasing. This work is to be carried on further towards the village as far as Southgate Spinneys. The refreshing of the white lines in North Rauceby is a welcome improvement.

The road that is Chapel Lane, North Rauceby is to be overlaid in the near future.

Thanks went out to villagers who do various voluntary jobs around the village.

The parking outside the Village Hall was talked about because it causes problems from time to time. It would be very helpful if persons using the hall .

could refrain from parking in the lay-by outside. This should just be used for loading un-loading. Also if everyone attending the hall could park on the same side of the road.

It has been noticed that many people are still driving whilst using their mobile phones. This is not only an offence, it is dangerous. Please don't do it.

The officer will carry out a fire risk assesment of the property and give advice on electrical safety, fire precautions, escape plans in the event of a fire and general fire safety advice. They are also offering to inspect fire alarms and if necessary provide and fit free of charge new smoke detectors to the property.

Not much to report this time. Unfortunately the Sleaford NHW spring meeting was cancelled due to illness. So it is like the TV at this time of year, repeat, repeat, repeat of things to be aware of.

With holidays taking place and having taken the usual precautions of cancelling the papers, milk, etc and also asking a good neighbour to take in your mail, there is few other things to think about.

Firstly weekly papers and leaflets. Delivery of these can not always be controlled by the householder, but it might be a good idea to ask any people who might deliver these things regularly to ensure they are pushed right through the letter box. If you are someone who does deliver such things it might be worth giving it some thought as with the light evenings, anyone can see quite clearly up driveways. Anything hanging out of the letterbox at the latter part of the day is dead giveaway that no one is in.

Finally dustbins can also arise the interest of the less scrupulous individual. 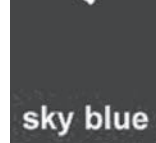

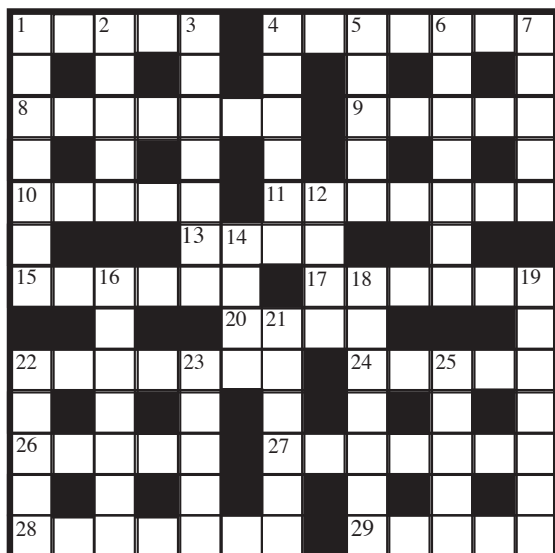

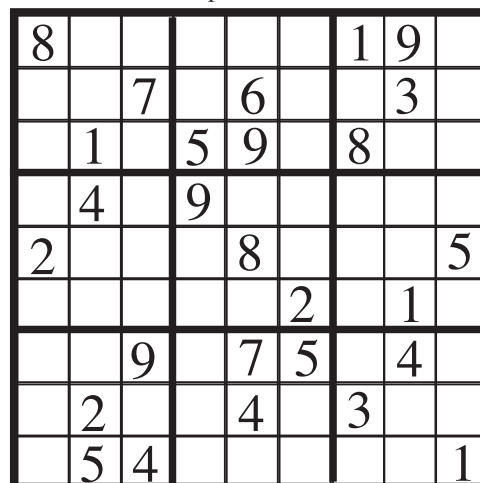

A Summer Supper

Breast of Chicken in an Orange and Tarragon Sauce

4 chicken breasts
1 good sized onion, chopped
a third of a pint of orange juice - freshly squeezed
4 sprigs of fresh tarragon, chopped or a tablespoon of dried tarragon
1 chicken stock cube in 4 fl. oz. boiling water
6 oz carton of sour cream
1 oz butter (generous!)
half an ounce cornflour (if you like a slightly thicker sauce)

I use a frying pan which will go in to the oven with its handle removed, but it is just as easy to transfer it to a casserole to put in the oven.

In a frying pan, melt the butter and oil, fry the onion for a couple of minutes, then add the chicken breasts and brown thoroughly on both sides. Stir in the orange juice, stock, and tarragon, and bring to the boil, stirring well. Cover with a lid(or transfer to a casserole dish with a lid) and cook in the oven at about 70 C for about an hour, or until the chicken is tender, stirring occasionally(this depends on the size of the chicken breasts). Remove the chicken

breasts on to a serving dish, then if you like a thicker sauce, mix the cornflour with 2 tablespoons of cold water, then add to the sauce, bring it back to the boil, and cook for a minute or two, stirring all the time. Cool slightly, add the sour cream, pour the sauce over the chicken and decorate with fresh tarragon and a couple of slices of orange, cut in half.

Quickly made lemon flan - but needs time to chill out!

For the flan case
4 oz digestive biscuits, crushed
2 oz butter
1 level tablespoon sugar (caster or granulated)

Melt the butter in a pan, add the sugar, then the biscuit crumbs, and mix well. Tip the mixture into a 7 inch flan dish and press around the base and sides with the back of a wooden spoon. Bake in a cool oven about 50 C for 8- 10 Minutes. Remove from the oven and leave to cool while you make the filling.

Filling

6 oz can condensed milk
Quarter of a pint double cream
2 large lemons - finely grated rind and juice.

Mix together the cream, condensed milk, finely grated lemon rind. Slowly beat in the lemon juice. Pour the mixture into the flan case and chill. Decorate with lemon slices.
